"Discovering your German Roots
The Great Migration: 1815-1914"
Presented by: Robert Jack



Even today, after waves of later immigration, more than twenty percent of all Americans claim primarily German descent, and many more have at least one German ancestor. It continues to be the largest single ethnic component of the American population.

To the delight of their descendants, the documentary sources available in Germany, many of them now available in the U.S. on line and on microfilm, facilitate the assembly of family trees of great age and depth, often back to the 1500s.

So where do we start? You know that your ancestors came from Germany, but from where in that huge country? Until we know their specific village of origin, we can't trace their roots. In this, the second of two presentations, we'll discuss the challenging task of discovering the hometown of your German ancestors.

Robert Jackson holds a Ph.D. in history from Harvard University. After several years' teaching at the college level, he pursued a professional career in finance. Since retiring he has assisted a variety of not-for-profit and community organizations and has enjoyed his hobbies of reading, genealogy, and tennis. He lives in Berkeley and lectures frequently on genealogical subjects. Sample websites include sophocles.com/priesmeyer, sophocles.com/meyer, and sophocles.com/duval. This presentation will be a continuation of last June's presentation and pick up where that one left off. It will be 2 hours in length. ■

You are both the explorer/gatherer and chief curator of your family's historical archives.

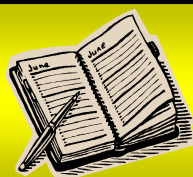
Early explorers enjoyed what they did – the lure of the hunt, visiting exotic lands, finding new plants, animals, artifacts, or cultures. But they knew that real, tedious and important work also went on back home, at the museum, where it took years to make sense of explorers' findings. So my



2 cents: it's wonderful to be the great explorer/gatherer of what your family left in their trail through time, but save some energy so you can be its great curator/interpreter, too! ►
