**MARCH MEETING**  
"My Father's Box Gave Me the Key"  
Speaker: Claudia Mortensen    Reported by: Lee Schlenker



**C**laudia Mortensen was our speaker for this month. The former owner of an interior design company (CAM Design) is also a member of long standing in our Society. This enthusiastic octogenarian spoke about finding a 1920s newspaper clipping in a trunk which belonged to her father, Capt. Oren J. Rose.

This article started her really searching for more information about her mother, Sonya Zarlova. Claudia's mother told her very little how things actually were in Russia. She only told little bits and pieces. Sonya Zarlova's father was a Count in Russia. They lived next door to the gentleman who ended up writing the book Lolita which was later made into a movie. The huge ceiling to floor front doors of the Zarlova's residence had large lions heads carved in it. When the Bolsheviks started on their rampage murdering prominent people they flung open the Zarlova's front doors and rode their horses right into the foyer. Some of her relatives were killed

and, as Sonya was a student activist, she went underground after this attack to help the cause.

Meanwhile, in the U.S., Oren J. Rose was attending school and accidentally got a girl pregnant, married her and then, not being able to cope, decided to flee to Canada and joined the Royal Air Force. After the war he flew into northern Russia trying to rescue the Czar but couldn't. At a prestigious ball he spotted Sonya Zarlova and immediately fell in love with her. She was still receiving underground information and was captured and imprisoned. When Oren heard that she had been captured, he and a friend managed to get Sonya out of prison, take her over the wall and into his waiting plane which flew to a British Air Base. She was then put onto a British transport. Claudia couldn't figure out why her mother's papers read her description to be 5'7" and blond when she was shorter than that and with dark hair. Sonya didn't come through Ellis Island because she had first class passage. People in first class had priority and docked in New York rather than having

to go through the Ellis Island portion. Oren and Sonya were married. In 1922 Claudia was born.

Living in the Los Angeles area was great fun for Claudia with movie stars and famous people - until the 1929 “crash.” Her father owned many car dealerships in the L.A. area and the “crash” took him under. One day he packed his bags, loaded the car and took off leaving Sonya and Claudia behind.

To help with an income Claudia’s mother had learned to produce her own homemade cosmetics and upon the urging of neighbors she started a cosmetic line which mushroomed in Beverly Hills! It afforded Claudia good schools to attend, a good college and on to the Cordon Bleu in Paris. Claudia speaks both Russian (her mother insisted on it) and French.

With all this said, there was a continuing parallel to this story: Claudia met her first husband while in school. Raymond Lawrence Adair was studying to be a lawyer. With WWII licking at his heels, he decided not to be a foot soldier and went to Canada to join the Royal Flying Corps. He became a B-17 pilot, was shot down over the Aleutian Islands - lost in the Bering Sea.

Claudia became a widow after three months of marriage at the sweet age of 19. She went into a mild depression and sought out her father - finding him once again a pilot. He asked her to come visit him. The trip helped her immensely.

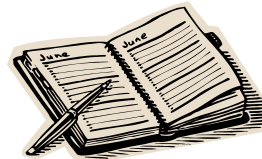
But for years after she could never find out any information on her husbands death at sea - it was classified. Many years later she went on the internet and found a book on this Alaskan episode. After reading the book she called the author who directed her to an information office in Alaska. Upon calling she was told 1 out of 3 planes had gone down in the Bering Sea - her husbands was one of them. There was a memorial erected to the men killed in the area just outside the information door. She also learned that there was a memorial to all men lost in WWII located in Honolulu, Hawaii. So she was able to bring closure to another portion of her life.

Claudia remarried a military man by the name of Mortensen (now deceased), which she met at a military function. They had two great sons. Pictures of both husbands hang in her home with equal respect.

Last year Claudia’s son gave her a first class trip to Russia so she could seek out more information on her mother. While getting her check-up before

leaving on this trip, her heart showed an irregularity. The doctor said she couldn’t travel until it was checked out thoroughly. She had to cancel this trip. And, wouldn’t you know, after the trip was cancelled her heart turned out to be just fine and healthy with the problem being the machines fault and not Claudia’s.

Soon after this, Claudia learned that a choir director from the LDS Church was going to Russia with her group to perform. Claudia asked if she could take a side trip while there in Russia and take pictures of her mother’s home and the surroundings. This director was able to locate and photograph Sonya’s childhood home, the street and surroundings. The huge doors with carved lions heads were still standing and well kept. This gave Claudia a good feeling that maybe she was not destined to see Russia. That there are mysteries that shouldn’t be overturned or looked into too carefully at this point in her life. She’s happy and content to leave things as they are.

## News from the Danville Family History Center

ancestry.com: As you may have heard, the full ancestry.com subscriptions will no longer be available at any of the family history centers under the present “free” status as of April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2007. However, the following databases will continue to be accessible: 1. Index and images for the 1880, 1900 and 1920 U.S. censuses 2. Full name indices for the British 1841-1891 censuses (England and Wales) 3. World War I draft cards indices as created, and miscellaneous other databases.

The LDS World Wide Support stated: “Free access to online databases is important. We therefore intend to add many new databases to FamilySearch.org (the website of the Mormon Family History Library). Much of the data preparation will be accomplished through the online indexing program available at FamilySearchIndexing.org. We encourage you to visit the website to learn more. Volunteers have already begun indexing the 1900 U.S. census and other projects. Other censuses and vital record collections will be indexed as soon as the 1900 U.S. census project is completed. The more volunteers that participate, the sooner access can be provided. Since access to databases on FamilySearch.org is free to all, we anticipate that this will be of great interest to individuals around the world. We are also exploring opportunities to provide broader access to additional databases from other online service providers.”

I'd like to thank our very own SRVGS members who are already helping out with this indexing program. You are greatly appreciated!

Nova Scotia Vital Records: Early vital records are viewable over the Internet for the first time and for free, thanks to a joint project by the Genealogical Society of Utah, FamilySearch, and the Nova Scotia Archives and Records Management (NSARM). The records include one million names found in birth records from 1864 to 1877, marriages from 1864 to 1930, and death records from 1864 to 1877 and 1908 to 1955. Users can search the

### State Records: The Other Censuses

You're familiar with the federal census records. Taken every ten years, they provide a major source of information for tracking your ancestors. But are you familiar with state census records and the information they have to offer?

#### WHAT ARE THEY?

State censuses were often taken between the federal censuses, falling on years that ended with a "5": 1885, 1895, 1905, 1915, 1925, 1935, 1945. States took census records for different reasons than the government did. They were taken to determine military strength, figure out where more schools were needed, discover how finances were distributed throughout communities, and gain statistics for urban planning.

The information contained in a state census differs depending on the reason the state conducted the census. Some contain scanty information, like head of household only; others contain more.

#### THE PROS

State census records are useful because they can confirm information found in federal census records. They can also fill in gaps. For example, most of the 1890 federal census was destroyed by a fire in the United States Commerce Department in 1921. State census records taken in 1885 and 1895 can help make up for this loss. State census records may also contain information not included in the federal census for the same area.

#### THE PROOF'S IN THE PUDDING

I decided to use the state census records to see what I could learn about my own family. Since the [Kansas State Census Collection, 1855-1915](#) was recently released and my great-grandmother Margery Kirkton was born in Kansas in 1891, I started my search there.

What I already knew was this. According to the 1880 federal census, Margery's parents, James and Flora Kirkton, were living in Greenwood, Jackson County, Missouri. According to the 1900 federal census, they were living in Canon City, Fremont County, Colorado. Sometime between 1880 and 1891, when Margery was born, they moved from Missouri to Kansas. And sometime between 1891 and 1900 they moved from Kansas to Colorado. Would I find them on any Kansas state census records?

When I entered "James Kirkton" in the Kansas state census search I found my answer: Yes. There they were listed in Garnett Anderson County in the

1895 Kansas state census with my great-grandmother Margery listed as a four-year-old toddler. Now my family timeline for the Kirktons goes like this: 1880, Missouri; 1891, Kansas; 1895, *Kansas*; 1900, Colorado. The Kansas state census also gave me one more piece of information I didn't have: James's occupation in 1895. In the 1880 federal census, James is listed as a druggist. In the 1900 federal census, James is listed as a fruit grower. In the 1895 state census, he is listed as a carpenter. Now that's what I call a jack-of-all-trades.

### COMING SOON . . .

If a state census record isn't available for the state you're researching, one may become available in the future. Ancestry.com is currently in the process of indexing state census records for Missouri, New Jersey, Minnesota, North Dakota, Illinois, South Dakota, Colorado, and Florida.

Of special note is the Iowa State Census, 1925, to be released later this month. It is famous for being one of the most comprehensive groups of state census records available. Besides the usual questions, enumerators asked for the place of abode (including house number and street); the number of years the person lived in Iowa; the names of parents (including mother's maiden name); places of birth, age if living, and place of marriage of parents; nine questions about military service; nine questions about occupation; church affiliation; and six questions about real estate. If only all enumerators had been so thorough!
