**March MEETING**  
**"The New Family Search "**  
Speaker: Marge Bell Reporter: Lee Schlenker



Our March meeting took quite a lot of us to Family History Center in Oakland for Marge Bell's talk on the *new* Family Search Website which they have been working feverishly on for months and months. Marge Bell is a wife, mother, grandmother, author of *Line Upon Line: A Beginners Guide to Genealogy* and Director of the Oakland Family History Center.

There is a massive indexing process going on at this time. There are over 100,000 people indexing over one million names per month.

Since Ancestry.com is no longer available as a free website through FHL, this route was taken up. Hopefully, this whole indexing process will be up and accessible by next year. We are all keeping the fingers crossed!

"New Family Search," which will replace Familysearch.org, was shown on the screen and Marge gave us a demonstration on how simple and easy it will be to search. This was a beta test site at the moment and right now can only be accessed through a Family History Center. A very

nice part of this site will be clicking onto a pedigree name, finding it along with a list of people who have submitted their citations of research allowing you a double check on which is the correct information and who has proved it. But an item in question on a pedigree can not be changed unless there is the original submitters approval. Changing information is critical and must be accurate.

[Search.labs.familysearch.org](http://Search.labs.familysearch.org) will have all microfilm digitized. This is being done by church members and volunteers at about 1 to 2 hours per week. This indexing is done twice since people can view things differently. These two products will then be looked at and checked making sure the average person is able to decipher it. Then it goes into permanent record. Hopefully these will be online free (through the FHL) if the contract is renegotiated. Right now the 1900 U.S. Census has 99% accuracy at the FHL.

[Footnote.com](http://Footnote.com) was the first to start up at the FHL which will offer you a photo of what you are researching (i.e. a Last Will and Testament) and you can scroll down to read the actual Will itself. Right now Footnote.com offers one film and one picture free (Beta site). Marge took us to the Utah Death Certificates, the certificate of a Parley Pratt of Salt Lake City and the actual death certificate was pictured online. You will be able to read the actual certificates in either the negative (white print on black background) or the positive (black print on white background) with a click of the mouse.

Many state records will not be online. There will be no newspapers online due to the fact that there are other ways to obtain the articles. The church would only be duplicating this process. They are still working on digitizing county records.

Using the card catalogue - the purple icon will default to the FHL of choice. Be precise with the name, county and state. Don't do a "quick search" because it brings up too many hits - narrow it down. You must know the proper category name to search for (i.e. "wills" should be "probate"). The site will truncate: PENNS will give you everything you never needed to know about Pennsylvania. If you do PENNS. (with a period after it) you will search a name instead.

The Family History Center offers [World Vital Records](http://WorldVitalRecords.com) (which is free), [Genline](http://Genline.com) (for Swedish, Danish, Norwegian) research. [Footnote.com](http://Footnote.com) will be indexing NARA Revolutionary War Records and Pension Records (the whole file) and the Susan Easton- Black records (17 linear feet of microfilm) will be digitized.

The Family History Center is hoping to set up all of this to be familiar with your use and very easy to maneuver around. They also are offering classes on getting familiar with their new system. ### President's Message

June first will be the start of our new fiscal year. In the last two months of this year your Board and the Committees will be busy planning our new budget, getting ready for our Annual Meeting on May 20 and encouraging members to help with the tasks needed to keep our organization running.

Thank you to the members who have stepped forward to volunteer for the Board positions of Membership and Programs. As of this writing we still need to find a Recording Secretary and a First Vice President. The first Vice President's workload is relatively minor, as long as the President is available most of the time. However, it is often a stepping-stone to the Presidency. More critical to us at the moment is the Recording Secretary position, as it is hard to imagine how we can operate without written records of the Board and General Meetings. We sincerely hope that there is someone from our membership willing to step into that job.

Our trip on March 18 to the Oakland Family History Center was extremely well attended and Marge Bell had some exciting news for us. The twin initiatives of the LDS leadership to expand the capabilities of [FamilySearch.org](http://FamilySearch.org) are impressive. Ultimately what we will have is:

- 1) A great many more fully indexed databases available with superior search capabilities.

- 2) Collaborative genealogy. For example, if you and five other people are working on the same 17th century relative, you can compare notes and sources and come to an agreement on what is correct and incorrect about that person's life. This direction is very much in keeping with many of the recent innovations that we see in collaborative computing, such as Wikipedia, wiki-mania, wikianswers, wikiquote, etc.

Our Newsletter, our emails and other sources have been filled with exciting educational opportunities, not least of which is the Mary Jane DeRoss Creative Writing Seminar to be held at the Danville FHC on Saturday, May 3. (See box below) If you are looking to expand your genealogical horizons, this is one of the many opportunities awaiting you.

We now have a new page on our website which makes it easy for you to find out if others in our society are researching the same surnames or locations. This is not a new system, just an implementation of an existing system via our website, making it much more accessible. Within our website, under *Resources*, go to *SRVGS Surnames and Localities Research List*. From there you can bring up an Excel or Acrobat document that will provide a reference code, such as F-9. That would be a member whose last name starts with F. You will find the code in our Handbook and can then contact that member and compare research. I want to thank those who helped to implement this feature.

### Philip B. Seelinger

I have been a member of SRVGS for one year and I volunteered to tell my story as a way to meet fellow members. So let me start. My story begins in Detroit. My parents had two children, my brother, who checked in at 4:07 pm, and me. I had been born seven minutes earlier, and we were identical twins. We were born on the first Saturday in May, Kentucky Derby Day, and my parents had hit the daily double. That was the year when *Cavalcade* won the derby by two and one-half lengths. I have always liked both of my given names: Philip and Bruce, and they are both long standing family names. I grew up in the Detroit area, went to school there, and moved to California and the Bay Area in 1968. My wife, also a native of Detroit, and I have three daughters, all

born in Detroit, now all married and living in the Bay Area; all of our sons-in-law are super and everybody gets along. We feel blessed! Enough about me.

I have been doing genealogy semi-seriously since 2002; my interest shifts to baseball in the spring and shifts back in the late summer when the A's are eliminated from any post-season. At this point, with the help of a professional genealogist in Salt Lake City, I have traced my direct Seelinger line back to mid-1600 and now I am trying to find other related Seelinger lines. My great grandfather Philip Frederick Seelinger was born in Hessen in 1820 and came by himself to the USA in 1840 and settled in Indiana. I do not know why he picked Indiana; to my knowledge he did not know anyone there nor did any other passengers on his ship settle in Indiana. But what I want to do is tell you what to me is an amazing story of help from a complete stranger.

In April 2007 while rereading an obituary of my above mentioned great grandfather I noticed for the first time that he was survived by two sisters in St. Louis. I joined a St. Louis Rootsweb list and posted the story of my great grandfather being survived by two sisters in St. Louis. Could anyone help? Within two days I received the most amazing, to me, e-mail. The e-mail listed three Seelinger family members, one previously unknown to me, and another family member with her husband and son. This woman sent me part of the ship manifest with all of their names. I was flabbergasted and annoyed. Here was a person who not only quickly filled in family members with some detail, but also closed out her e-mail by saying "if these are not your [my] family I [she] am a monkey's uncle."

I did what any genealogist would do: I simmered down and stalled by saying that I would have to verify the information and I would get back to her. She, of course, was right on the whole bunch being my family. I found that St. Louis has more records in much better condition than my family's Ripley County, Indiana, records. After I did verify the information I wrote my "new best friend" a nice e-mail thanking her. And in reading what I ultimately found I noticed that this St. Louis bunch first went to Indiana. Now I have to search that out. The hunt continues . . .
