"Genealogical Holdings of the Pleasant Hill Library"
Presented by: Turalu Brady



Our speaker for February is Turalu Brady. She will tell us about the genealogical holdings in the Pleasant Hill Library. She has been the Librarian at the Heritage Library in Pleasant Hill almost since its beginning when it was organized by the DARs of the area. She is a retired teacher from the Walnut Creek Schools, and has taught English to the Foreign Born and Educationally Handicapped children in the Mt Diablo schools. She has lived in Walnut Creek for 50 years and has been involved in many community activities, including the Valley Art Center and Children's art classes in Walnut Creek and Lafayette. She is a member of the DAR and many Heritage organizations and has been an officer in many of them. She is Honorary Vice President National of the United States Daughters of 1812 and was the Librarian National at their War of 1812 Library for 8 years.

January Meeting
"City Directories"

Speaker: Dr. Stephen Harris Reporter: Lee Schlenker

Dr. Stephen Harris earned his PhD at UC Berkeley and decided to remain in the East Bay area not returning to his home town of Brooklyn, N.Y. He worked for the Contra Costa Health Department as Director of Planning and Evaluation for 33 years. He started researching genealogy intensively after his family records were destroyed in the Oakland "Fire Storm." He became interested in other peoples relatives and found them so intriguing that he became a professional genealogist.

Dr. Harris has a large collection of City and County Directories and some phone books located in Oakland at the California State Genealogical Society on Broadway. His collection num-

bers over 6,000 and growing. (There was an 18-page list of his holdings sent E-mail to SRVG folks who signed up for E-mail data and info from Ed Mason.)

Dr. Harris walked us through the 1) need for city directories, 2) where and when they were created, and 3) how information was collected. He claims the city directory is the "unappreciated stepchild of genealogy." The directories came in all shapes, sizes and are very similar to our phone books nowadays. They were started in the 18th century in the largest cities. So, the directories were here long before the telephone or the phone book. It was a way of finding people within a city or finding businesses you needed. Compiling a

directory was annual and very expensive to send a person door to door gathering the needed information as the population grew. A graph showed that in 1820 the urban population was 7.2% and by 1940 the urban population rose to 56.5%. And nowadays 85% live in cities. So the phone book quickly took over the city directories and, in essence, “killed off” the directories. Before WWII few people had telephones but after WWII everyone had a phone and the phone books became prevalent. In 1934 the N.Y. City 1933 Directory was printed and it was their last directory printed because of the Depression. Ultimately, it is nice to have a city’s directory and then a phone book consecutively in years, but that’s not always the case. Directories were printed, so you didn’t have to decipher someone’s poor handwriting.

What will you find inside a city directory? The first thing to look at with a directory is the spine. What is written on the spine is not necessarily what you will find inside. An example: the outside reads “NYC Directory of May, 1872” but the inside reads “NYC Directory for year ending May 1, 1872. So if you have an an-

cestor in NYC in May, 1872 you may not find his/her name listed. City maps are a “good thing” if they are still in tact. Often times they have been ripped out. Next, check out the Table of Contents. It will list government offices (Federal, state, local), volunteer groups, homes/asylums, fire department, social groups, schools (all types), ads (if your ancestor had a business the ad could hold a picture of him - they loved to show their proprietorship), residential listings. Residential listings were done last name, male first name, occupation, and address; then the wife; next, the children. There is also a page which tells you what the abbreviations are next to names in the residential listings. Lower case ‘b’ meant you are a boarder in your parents home (depending on the street address) or you could just be a boarder in a boarding house. Lower case ‘h’ meant you are the homeowner or head of household. ‘Wid’ meant you were a widow or a widower. In some directories minorities were not listed but if they should be ‘col’ would mean colored. ‘do’ meant ditto (just so they didn’t have to rewrite the address again). There can also be a reverse listing in the directory: that would be the street name listed with bounda-

ries of the streets and then the address with the name next to it. The 'o' after a name meant they were the owner and a tiny bell symbol before the name meant they had a phone. Often there might be the phone exchange listing (e.g. ADams and a four digit number). If you had an ancestor living in a rural area near that city you might want to check the very back of the directory or the county directory for some rural information.

Dr. Harris said that trying to find an ancestor in the U.S. Census can be difficult when the Census is released every 10 years. There is a lot that can happen within those 10 years and it's easy to lose someone if they move or die. With a city directory it's easier to track their movement between Census periods. Often a directory may have a List of Removals which could be that that person has moved or died. The removal means they no longer are at that address listed the year before. Or you might find the wife's name with 'wid' after it which means she's a widow. So you have narrowed a search down to within a year by using a directory. Now you can search death records or obituaries for that year. Dr. Harris says finding someone in the Census can be hard but if you find them in the city directory, get the address, go to the Reverse Directory where there can often times be names you recognize being nearby, then look it up in the census, you stand a good chance of finding who you're hunting for.

Often you can find changes in the occupations of your ancestors in the city directories as you follow them year to year.

Large libraries, state libraries, Library of Congress, Sutro (on microfilm no hard copies) and online copies (which he says are not too wonderful, often slow and don't recognize broken character so can't find you what you're looking for) are all places to find city directories. But the "online" is not the end all, be all because they omit a lot more items. Family History Center's Footnote.com is a good source for directories of large cities.

The changes were minor, merely rewording a sentence or two, in order to more explicitly express the original intent. After final Board approval, you will be copied and have a chance to discuss and vote on them.

Our officers and committee people who are devoted to Membership, Community Outreach and Membership Liaison have been doing a tremendous job.
