**"Organizing Your Stuff"**  
Presented by: **Richard Rands**

**February Meeting**  
**"Genealogical Holdings of the Pleasant Hill Library"**  
Speaker: Turalu Brady Reporter: Lee Schlenker



Probably 50% or more of us in our Society have been to the Pleasant Hill Library on one occasion or another to visit the Heritage Library within that library. Turalu Brady, who has been the librarian there for many years since her retirement from teaching in Contra Costa County schools, gave her informative talk on how the Heritage Library was first created. She also handed out a map of the Heritage Room, the example of how the books are shelved, how items

are listed in their print-outs and an example of what you will find in the card catalog.

The Heritage Room started back in the 1970s when the D.A.R. started to gather books on family genealogy and local histories. Through much persuasion they got some shelving installed in the Pleasant Hill Library - a total of three book-cases. But as people used those few books they would disappear - and often! So, it was apparent that a system had to be created to account for the

books within those shelves. But, before that could truly happen the genealogy section grew and then quickly outgrew their designated space. There soon was another “okay” to build more shelving for the many books. And, again, that quickly was filled to capacity. At about that same time, the Contra Costa Genealogy Society came into being; and with their “clout,” they proposed taking the D.A.R. books and cataloging them. The librarian said there wasn’t enough manpower to do all that cataloging, but she would accept volunteers to help. So, the Contra Costa Genealogical Society, the D.A.R. and other Heritage groups volunteers started working on the books. They soon realized that there needed to be a modification to the Dewey Decimal System in the Heritage Library. And rather than using the R929 numbers (the reference only code in the Dewey system) they adopted the D.A.R. system of categorizing the books.

On the book spine they listed the Acquisition Number; the States in alpha order first; then Category or topic next ( e.g. census, fami-

lies, foreign); Books (in alpha order) related to county info; third - Book Content in alpha order (e.g. History comes before Marriage); next comes last Name of Author; fifth is the Book Title; and sixth is the Section number (where the book is stored). The Section numbers run completely around the perimeter of the Heritage Room starting with Section #1 and continuing around to Section #15. After all this listing of the sections and books involved, they needed to produce a card catalog of these books and documents. The catalog listings are much like the spine of the books. And it all got done as the Heritage Room grew and grew with donations from genealogists all around the county areas. The collection numbers close to 4,000 books, periodicals, maps, stories, etc.

There is a large California Family periodical and information collection. The only other Early California information location is in Santa Clara. The Heritage Room has organizations listings including the Mayflower, New England Heraldry.

There is a separate index file for the periodicals which are then listed by state.

The Pleasant Hill Library is part of the Contra Costa County system. The Library is located at:

There are usually docents to aid you in your resource hunt. There are microfilm readers if you should need them. "The Vault" contains local and historical material as well as some California census records. And volunteers are always needed for daily time-slots if you would care to volunteer.



### President's Message By Ed Mason

No, we can't say goodbye to local libraries, courthouses, newspaper microfilm and various sources in faraway paces. However, with time always at a premium and financial resources dwindling, we can cheer the fact that so much genealogical information is now available online. If you are like most people doing genealogy today you are likely to have made good use of Ancestry.com and FamilySearch.com, as well as other sources. Sneaking up on us is another important resource that you may not have used to its full extent. That source is Google, where you are now able to access many times more records than was possible just a couple of years ago. Although I don't pretend to be an expert, this letter will give you some tips on how to uncover it.

First subject: Google Books. In the upper left hand corner of the Google search page you will see, *Web, Images, Maps, News, Video, Mail and More*. Hit the down-arrow to the right of *More*. The third item down is *Books*. Go to that. When you type in the name of your ancestor, the results will include his or her mention in the contents of the many thousands of books that have been scanned. To cut down on the number of hits, you can insert a

comma followed by a location. Each book listed will indicate whether you will have access to a *Snippet View* or a *Full View*. This depends on the book's copyright status. Google states: *If the book is in the public domain and therefore out of copyright, you can page through the entire book and even download it and read it offline. But if the book is under copyright, and the publisher or author is not part of the Partner Program, we only show basic information about the book, similar to a card catalog, and, in some cases, a few snippets -- sentences of your search terms in context. The aim of Google Book Search is to help you discover books and learn where to buy or borrow them, not read them online from start to finish. It's like going to a bookstore and browsing - with a Google twist.*

I'm having trouble getting this letter written because I am discovering so much new information in various books about my relatives. Of course, it helps to have relatives whose families have been in the country for a couple of centuries or more. Anyhow, when you get to the page of the book that shows your relative's name, the name will be highlighted in yellow wherever it appears. On the upper right of the page is a choice between *View Plain Text* and *View Page Images*. You can toggle between the two at your leisure. In the *View Plain Text* you will be able to copy and paste.

Second subject: Regular Google searches. Daniel M. Lynch wrote a book entitled, *Google Your Family Tree, Unlock the hidden power of Google*. The following suggestions came from the appendix of that book and they all have to do with ways to get better results by narrowing your Google searches:

1. If you are looking for Ezra Mason, put quotation marks around both names, i.e., "Ezra Mason" – otherwise you will get all of the Ezras and all of the Masons (including the bricklayers).
2. If you want to narrow the search, i.e., search for "Ezra Mason" and Michigan. That will prioritize the Ezra Masons in Michigan.
3. If you are looking for either of two items, say Ezra **or** his wife, then search for "Ezra Mason" or "Harriet Mason". That will find either of them.

4. If you want to get results including a keyword, use a plus sign, i.e., "*Ezra Mason*" + *birth*.
5. To narrow results with a keyword or a word similar to the keyword, use a tilde, i.e., "*Ezra Mason*" *Michigan~genealogy*
6. To find results within a certain date range, use double dots, i.e., "*Ezra Mason*" *1813..1897*
7. To get results for a query that will exclude a word or a phrase, use a dash before the word that you wish to exclude, i.e., "*Ezra Mason*" *michigan-new york*. *Ezra* spent time in both places. This will find him in Michigan but will not find him in New York.
8. Use can use a wildcard to replace one or more characters, i.e., "*Ezra\*Mason*". Use a double asterisk to replace two words, a triple asterisk to replace three, etc.

These are the main tips. Many of them can be used in combination. So, experiment with them. There is a lot of information waiting to be found. Good luck.

Even if you think you know everything there is to know about your parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles, researching them thoroughly helps build a strong genealogical foundation. Keep in mind that contemporary records have more detail and could have some clues to ancestral origins that older records do not.

### 1940 Federal Census

The official date for the release of the 1940 Federal census is April 1, 2012. That's the date the census is released from the 72-year privacy mandated by law. And that's the date family historians will be descending on the National Archives in order to open another chapter in their quest for their ancestors. However, no indexes will be available, so researchers will be required to know the correct Enumeration District in the city or town where their ancestors lived.

You can start preparing by determining and making note of the street addresses of all of your ancestors that you may be looking for in this census. It is possible that, at the time of the census release, third party tools will be available to help locate these addresses in the correct enumeration districts.

The census takers asked 35 standard questions. In addition, 15 supplementary questions were asked of a random sample. You can find out what these questions were and other information about the 1940 census at:
