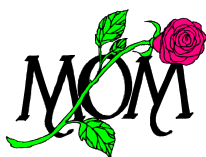

**"Tap Into Your Inner Private Eye:
7 Strategies You Need to Find Living Relatives"**
Presented by: Lisa Louise Cooke



Learn how to track down those elusive living relatives who just may hold the key to your brick wall or possess that treasured photo you've been looking for. It's easy to get caught up with finding dead relatives, but it's the living ones who can share their personal stories, their boxes of photos in their attic, and their address book full of other relatives. It's imperative that you find and talk to these folks while you still can. But finding a living person can prove quite a challenge in today's identity security conscience society. Lisa Cooke has interviewed private investigators who are in the business of locating people, and brings their tips and techniques to you.

April Meeting
"A New Look at Immigrant Passenger Manifests"

As well as earning his PhD in Botany and Plant Pathology, Steve Danko recently completed his requirements for the Professional Learning Certificate in Genealogical Studies (PLCGS) for the National Institute for Genealogical Studies, University of Toronto. Steve now resides in San Francisco, CA. He began his research ten years ago and studied American, Canadian and Polish records.

Before 1820 there were no lists required of the ship lines. From 1820 to 1860 only name, age, sex, occupation, nationality, intent to become a citizen or death at sea noted. By 1890 the manifest listings were becoming more extensive with information. There were columns to be filled out by the ship's captain. The manifests look more like the U.S. Census with information. Even how long the immigrant was going to stay and with whom. Then by 1900 not only the name, age, sex,

length of trip, but final destination was listed, who paid for the passage, marital status, could you read/write, how much money did you have with you, and then personal questions: are you a felon, a cripple, a polygamist, a person under contract, last residence. By 1910 the manifests got even longer with all of the above listed plus who were you visiting, your intent of the visit, place of birth, were you in the U.S. before, were you an anarchist. By the end of 1910 these manifests became two pages long with required information; they were titled "Manifest of Alien Passenger for the United States." By 1920 a column was added for "head tax." And every year thereafter the forms became more and more precise so by 1940 a column was added "do you plan to overthrow the government."

Steve went through "how to decipher the annotations" on the passenger lists filled out at the point of departure. "Contact number," "head tax number" (had to pay a tax), "not shipped," "NOB" (not on board), "did not sail," "cancelled" (not everyone sailed or they were too

sick to sail), the line crossed out could be "not there" or "upgraded to a different class," "X," "D" (detained), "Held." Look at the *end* of the manifest if your immigrant had an "X" "D" "Held" in the first column. The detainee's line should show the cause, how many meals eaten at Ellis Island, time of discharge. The term "to be tagged" meant literally a shipping tag was placed on a person. Some reasons for tagging: person couldn't speak English well enough so had their name and destination written out, was going to be picked up or transferred to a relative, was a minor. The next two annotations were very bad ones - "S.I." (Special Inquiry) or "B.S.I." (Board of Special Inquiry) meant a Board of Inquiry comprised of three persons would listen to the immigrants case and make a decision whether to deport them or allow them to stay. "USB" or "US Born" or "USC" (U.S. citizen), "C #####" which is a special certificate issued.

There were annotations even after the time of arrival such as: re-entry numbers on the certificate of arrival (after 1906) to legally enter into the U.S. And issuance of the certificate of arrival (C.A.) with the date of arrival and numbers - e.g. #1 (East Coast arrival), X (before 1903), #151593. The number "1" meaning East Coast included the states of CT, MA, ME, NH, RI, VT. Other annotations after arrival were V/L = verification of landing, W/A = warrant of arrest, "In Hospital," "Discharged," "Died in Hospital." Steve says to carefully check the manifest. Often times these manifests were microfilmed starting at the end of the list and filmed going forward to the beginning of the list. Others were microfilmed from the beginning to the end of the list.

If a detainee ate meals while at Ellis Island the shipping line had to pay for all his meals consumed and/or if deported the shipping line had to pay his/her passage back home. So, the shipping lines made sure all their "ducks were in a row" before registering and carrying a person to the U.S. after 1920. If a woman arrived pregnant the letters "LPC" might be written meaning "Likely Public Charge" (a burden on society) which meant she could be deported if she had no attachment within the U.S.

At Ellis Island there were strict rules and regulations as to the mental and physical health of

the immigrant: alcoholic? cripple? feeble minded? idiot? imbecile? immoral? insane? illiterate? moral turpitude? senile? pregnant? under 16? vagrant? TB? eye infections? Each immigrant's jacket was chalk-marked with a certain mark denoting their problem. In 1918 the inspectors at Ellis Island had a manual depicting pictures of what a person with mental defects would or should look like. Then they could better distinguish who was mentally defective by looks. There were also hand-written rules for idiots and imbeciles.

Steve says to remember to look for everything on the manifest once you've found the one you're searching for. The manifest should show if the ship was an indirect passage (put into another port after sailing to pick up more passengers). The Certificate of Arrival should be attached to the manifest. Tracking ships into Canada could be difficult because many people crossed into the U.S. at the Canadian border. You could have some luck with the St. Albans, VT records. There are departure lists from Bremen and Hamburg as well as the White Star Line lists. Other good sources of information are Ancestry.com and Steve Morse.org websites.

A GENTLE REMINDER

The Society year is coming to a close. The new year starts on June 1st, and your annual membership fee is due by then. For your convenience, we have attached a membership renewal form to this newsletter. Please take the time to send it in with your check, now, while you are thinking about it.

Proposed by-law changes:

The Society's Board of Directors is proposing changes to the Society's *Constitution and By-laws*. These same by-laws require that the proposed changes be published in the newsletter before the membership votes on the changes. The proposed changes are presented below. Strike-outs indicate deletions, and additions are shown in ***bold Italics***. The *Constitution and By-laws*, as currently written, can be found in your Society Handbook.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

Section B. Dues. Annual dues shall be payable June 1, and delinquent on August 1. ***A delinquent member shall be dropped from the membership rolls and no longer receive Society publications.***

Section D. Honorary Life Membership. This may be conferred upon any member who has given exceptional service. The recommendation shall be signed by one member and approved by the Board of Directors before being presented to the membership for a vote. A three-fourths vote shall elect. ***A Life Member shall retain the privileges of a regular Society member.***

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section A. Regular Meetings. ~~General membership meetings of the Society shall be held a minimum of eight months per year.~~ ***Each year there will be a minimum of eight monthly general membership meetings.***

Section B. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Society may be called by the President, ~~the~~ ***or*** Board of Directors, or by the written request of ten members. A written notice stating the purpose of the meeting shall be given at least ten days prior to said meeting. No business other than that stated shall be conducted.

ARTICLE XI PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

Section A. The rules contained in ***the current edition*** of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised shall govern the Society in all cases in which they are applicable.



IN MEMORIAM

BARBARA ("BEA") NEALE O'RAND

The Society recently learned of the death of Bea O'Rand on January 20, 2009 in North Carolina. She was a past president (1989-1991) and honorary Life Member of SRVGS. For a number of years she hosted the Southern Interest Group and, as a member of the Publishing Interest Group, she helped to write "Print Publish and Preserve," a society publication. She researched her own English families as well as her husband's American roots. Her books are listed on our SRVGS website.

Bea was born in Durham County, England (she never lost her English accent), grew up in Norfolk and was studying in London during the bombings of World War II. She was evacuated to Cambridge where she met and married Texan Mike O'Rand, a flyer in the U.S. Air Force. After the war they made their home in Texas where she finished her degrees and taught before moving to California. After retiring as an administrator in the San Ramon Valley Unified School District, she became an active and valued member of our society. She often said her interests were the "three G's: genealogy, gardening and golf." In 1995, she and Mike moved to the Southern Pines community in North Carolina to be closer to their son and grandson. After her husband died in 1997, she became active in many historical and gardening organizations there. Also, she was the center of communications for her many relatives scattered around the globe.

She is survived by her son Michael in North Carolina, grandson Christopher and great-grandson Dylan in Florida. Her passing is a loss for all who knew her.

ROBERT ("Bob") KAY

Robert Kay, a past SRVGS member, passed peacefully away in San Diego April 6, age 85, survived by his wife Norma, 3 children, 5 grand children and six great grand children. He was born in Keokuk, Iowa. He served in the navy in WWII and worked for Chemetron, retiring after 38 years as vice-president. He lived in Walnut Creek. He was a very pleasant person while in SRVGS, and contributed to shared programs several times.
