





Janet will be discussing online family trees and how best to use them to your advantage.

Janet Brigham is vice-president of the Silicon Valley Genealogy Computer Group, and is a family history consultant. A former journalist and an editor, she has been editor-in-chief of the award-winning SvcGG monthly newsletter, *PastFinder*. The newsletter has been named best in the United States for three consecutive years.

Janet has worked professionally as a research psychologist and applies decades of research skills to genealogy research, with an emphasis on Internet research, technology, and research accuracy. ■



From the April Meeting
“Tips for Breaking Down Brick Walls”

Lisa provided a finely presented talk outlining distinct steps to overcome a genealogical “brick wall”, when you cannot answer a question, find an ancestral maiden name, or seek an ancestor in an historical event. Hers was Ireland (a common problem).

1. Check your old notes; if doing genealogy for many years, you might have answers long ago that you did not then realize. Scrutinize the documents you collected. Did you really obtain all the data from a census or other source? Reread the record; reread obits, etc.

2. Reorganize your research; patterns might

show; use tables, lists, spreadsheets. Use charts for land records, check land descriptions, maps and distances from neighbor’s homes. (Those closer are more likely related). Check locality of churches for ones most likely to hold data.

3. Check timelines. WRITE about what you know, starting with the timeline. Write about your problem.

4. Broaden your research; check siblings and their children. Keep track of neighbors in census records and in land/tax records. Record all residences of the family and of collaterals over the years. Keep track by dates and places. Search ►

neighboring counties. Try new record groups, for example, court, probate, land, criminal, armed forces, city directories, newspapers and pensions. In newspapers, note items on the community.

5. Did you cause your own brick wall? False assumptions? Not flexible in surname spelling? Not familiar with the record and why it was created? (FS wiki and Cyndi's List helpful here.) Take classes on record sets. Was the ancestor hidden--remarried, children under stepfather's name, used initials only (especially in the south), not in the index, but perhaps in the original?

Further tips:

- Get organized, use research logs. Family Tree and Ancestry both have downloadable logs.
- Frustrated? Work on another line for awhile, or take a break. Have someone else look at your data or hire a researcher to get a fresh look.
- Try new strategies by first names, ►

locations. Start broad and narrow or reverse that. Sometimes, you need little pieces of evidence put together; indirect evidence.

- SOURCE everything well!

Also note where you looked and did not find anything. Note negative evidence; write down the books and databases explored and dates--especially if doing research for others. ■



President's Message



Genealogy related items continue to grow in the internet as search engines accumulate more and more data throughout the world. Last month I mentioned YouTube and the many elements it holds. There is also the WayBack Machine, Archives.org, JSTORR, Google Scholar, An Ancestors Public Library, Sources, Memory.loc.gov, worldcatalogue.org, FHLcatalogue wiki, Genforum, USgenweb.org, archivegrid.org, and many other exotic sources that we, myself included, have likely not explored. It is a strange new source world for us mostly "old timers" intrigued by a search for ancestral information.

This month, I explored <archives.org> which contains ebooks with sources including the University of Toronto, California digital library, Library of Congress, European library, Boston Consortium and Public Library, Allen county public library, Columbia University library, Universities of Illinois and Florida, New Hampshire, Alberta, Mississippi, and Pittsburg. Even the National library of Scotland. In addition, this site has connections to the wayback machine, live music archives, audio archives, moving image archives, and registered data providers. Items from NASA, the national agriculture library, and medical heritage library are included.

Exploring each of the above items is a major undertaking. For instance, under European library are a myriad of countries, from England, through Europe, to India, in a number of languages. "Community texts" likewise contains dozens of varied items (most do not relate to genealogy), ►

in several languages. A start in genealogy can lead one to a broad education when frustrated after wandering down a long alley to find the right open door to an ancestor (alley sounds more promising than beating against a brick wall).


