



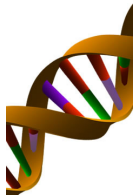

**"You've Got Your DNA Results, Now What? "**  
**Presented by: Pam Miller**



This presentation is for those who have submitted DNA samples or are considering it and want to know the best steps and strategies to make family connections from the results. We will develop the concepts necessary to work with your results meaningfully and then we'll explore the various tools for organizing and working with your DNA results, including those at the testing companies and the important third party sites, e.g., dnagedcom.om, gedmatch.com. Please note this is a two hours session and remember to bring the presentation handout with you. The handout will be e-mailed to you shortly!

Pam Miller, a native of Dallas, Texas, attended Stanford where she earned a B. A. in Linguistics and an M. A. in Spanish. She was employed as an educator in the Bay Area for twenty-eight years, teaching Spanish and computer science. Pam has been using the various DNA tests in her search since the early 2000s. She has been a member of CGS since 2005 and is currently teaching ongoing DNA classes there. ■



**From the June Meeting**  
**"Discovering your German Roots**  
**The Great Migration: 1815-1914"**

**Presented by: Robert Jackson    Reported By: Russ Erickson**



Dr. Jackson has a PhD in history from Harvard; has been a professor as well as working in financial fields and with non-profit organizations. Dr. Jackson gave his presentation in two parts: the first discussing the history of Germany and the migration to America; the second was about how to research German genealogy.

[Part 1] The 19th century saw the Great Migration from Germany to America. Now we

seek our ancestors: I think that I shall never see-- the end of genealogy. It can be a long search. In the 1890s and before, farming families in Germany tended to live in one big building with their animals, important to their living. People who came to America tended to be peasants with no land in Germany, but they usually came with enough money to reach a start. From 1850s to 1870s, most came from western German provinces, initially to the Pennsylvania area with ►

other Germans; from there, west through Ohio and the Midwest to the northern west coast and to the gold fields with the 49ers. With time, more came from eastern Germany as industrialization spread and took away homespun jobs, especially in weaving linens.

In 1776, there were about 250,000 Germans in America, Hessians stayed during and after the Revolutionary War. By 1840 to 55 there were 4 million, adding 100,000 yearly--approximating the Irish. Few came during the Civil War. In 1870s, Germans in Russia encouraged by Catherine the Great lost their privileges, and many more came. St. Louis, Missouri became another large center.

Germans were noted as intelligent (from the 1700s, all were educated to age 14), industrious, and honest. They did not come fleeing hunger or religion, but sought a better life and a chance to work for themselves. Smallpox vaccinations and adding potatoes to diets helped boost German province populations and America was advertising plentiful land for farmers and ►

homesteading. Before and after the Civil War ships also went to Europe full of cotton and needed cargo coming back, so immigrants were given cheap passage. Letters from America to German relatives were full of the richer life and encouraging more to come. Taxes were lower too!

When seeking your German ancestors, always start with the USA census data. Then check local church records which are often very good, with many family facts. Read them yourself if it is possible to travel to the towns of known ancestors. In any search, try varied spelling of family names--the German was often confused and misspelled. Consider local historians and genealogists for help; especially any conversant in German. In Germany, parish records are rich, especially Protestant. There is less in Catholic records, but they go back sometimes to the 1400s. More Catholic in southern Germany and Protestant in north. Some farm maps exist of old farm holds in Germany. Go on the web for *Largest Ancestry Map 2000*.

[Part 2] Seek people knowledgeable in German genealogy to talk to. From 1700 to 1871 there were many German provinces, but not a united Germany. (It was largely united under Bismarck). Until 1917, WWI, Germany extended far east, but after the war, much of the East was given to Poland. (That region was once half German and half Polish in population). Many records for the remaining East Germany were destroyed in WW II.

In Germany, there are many villages with the same names. Finding someone who KNOWS German villages and parishes can save you much time in your search. Immigrants often gave the name of a big city near their origin instead of their village to sound more important, or gave Hamburg, the port city, as their origin. Again, there can be many variations in spelling for German names in the Nineteenth century and even into the Twentieth. There are often 3 given names before the surname, frequently with a god parent name or 2 involved.

Dr. Jackson presented his approach to tracking a family using censuses, church records, finding ancestors in Pomerania and even Russia. He mentioned *Das Telefonbuch* (<https://www.dastelefonbuch.de>), an online German telephone directory for searching family names in present day Germany. ■

On July 18<sup>th</sup> we are fortunate to have Pam Miller as our speaker; she will give a 2-hour presentation on DNA testing and its implications for genealogy. This field can be very complicated, but our speaker promises not to take us too deeply into the DNA weeds, but interpreting results can generate more questions than answers. This is a dynamic field, with frequent, new discoveries. If you want a better understanding of DNA testing and results, don't miss this program! ■
